

The Sinclair Bruce Diary

The first meeting for Lodge Seaforth for the coming season was held on Monday the 17th September. The Grand Lodge of Nigeria

Visit to Tinapa, Calabar to Consecrate the new Grand Lodge of Nigeria.

On Tuesday 30th October 2012, I met up with the Grand Master Mason, Bro Charles Iain R Wolrige Gordon of Esslemont, Bro George Dunlop, Grand Master, Grand Lodge of Ireland and Bro Barry Lyons, Grand Secretary, Grand Lodge of Ireland in the Paris Charles de Gaulle Airport from where we travelled to Abuja, Nigeria.

We were met at Abuja by the two District Grand Secretaries – Bro Reginald Abbey-Hart (SC) and Bro Frank-Igwe (IC) who, along with their colleagues arranged for all luggages to be safely transported to the hotel where we spent our first night in Nigeria.

After a welcome rest, the party returned to Abuja Airport on Wednesday 31st October and flew to Calabar where the Grand Master Mason and the Grand Master of Ireland were officially welcomed to Calabar by the Grand Master of Nigeria (Elect), Bro His Majesty Nnaemeka Alfred Achebe, Obi of Ontisha. Accompanied by an armed escort from the Nigerian Police Force, we sped from the airport to the Tinapa Hotel and Conference Centre, Calabar where the majority of the weekend activities would take place.

Having enjoyed a very welcome lunch, everyone joined the convoy again and headed back into Calabar where first, was a visit to Lodge Hope No 1156 (SC). Lodge Hope was erected and consecrated in 1916 as the first Scottish Lodge in Calabar. From Lodge Hope, we travelled to Lodge MacDonald No 197 (IC) which was the first Irish Lodge to be consecrated in Nigeria in 1897. The visits were most enjoyable and informative. Indeed Lodge Hope was the only Lodge I've been in where they had their own cemetery in the grounds.

During the evening we enjoyed the hospitality of the Nigerian Brethren at a cocktail reception in the hotel.

On Thursday 1st November – temperature just over 30 degrees – there was a mass exodus of Brethren to the Palace of a local king, Brother His Majesty Dr Etim Okon Edet and his Council of Traditional Rulers where we were well received and presented with traditional long tooth cleaning implements in decorative carrying cases.

From there we travelled to the HQ of the Nigerian Union of Journalists in Calabar where a press conference had been arranged. Journalists from both local and national papers were present along with colleagues from radio and television. Many of the questions fired at the panel were as expected, but one journalist came away with a

totally unexpected question – what is the view of Freemasons on single sex marriages – a question that was very tactfully dealt with by the Grand Secretary, Grand Lodge of Ireland indicating that Freemasonry as a body had no political or religious views and that such a question was one for individuals to come to terms with. It should be noted that subsequent to the Press Conference, the Consecration of the new Grand Lodge received excellent positive coverage from all media disciplines.



Immediately after breakfast on Friday 2nd November, the Scottish and Irish Deputations accompanied by a goodly number of Nigerian Brethren were greatly privileged to travel to the Palace of the Obong of Calabar, His Eminence Edidem Ekpo Okon Abasi Otu V, Obong of Calabar, Natural Ruler, Treaty King and the Grand Patriarch of the Efik Eburutu Kingdom. The entire party were given a very warm welcome by the King and his Council of Traditional Rulers. Speeches were made by the King, by the Grand Master of Ireland and by our own Grand Master Mason after which photographs were taken outside the Palace.

On the Friday afternoon, the Grand Master Mason and the Grand Master of Ireland paid a visit to the Governor of Cross River State, His Excellency, Liyel Imoke while I, along with the Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Ireland made arrangements to hold a rehearsal ahead of the Consecration on the Saturday. The Rehearsal lasted quite some time but proved its worth on the day.

About 7.00 pm on the Friday night, the convoy was on the move again – this time to the home of Bro Chief Charles Okon where we were treated once again to truly exceptional hospitality. On returning to the hotel, it was time for a reasonably early night before the big day dawned.

While it was my intention to start the Consecration of the new Grand Lodge of Nigeria on time, due to the fact that the conference centre ran out of chairs, the start was delayed by twenty minutes. Over 500 Brethren were packed into the room when the MW Grand Master Mason entered to open the Grand Lodge of Scotland. He was

assisted by MW Bro Charles William Stanley-Pierre, GM of Ghana in the office of Acting Grand Senior Warden, Bro Charles Johnson, DGM of Bahamas in the office of Acting Junior Grand Warden and Bro Rev Canon Josephus Jaja, Acting Grand Chaplain.



The Ceremony of Consecration followed the normal procedure with a few new changes. After the Three-fold Blessing the Grand Master Mason dedicated the new Lodge Regalia in an exemplary manner much to the delight of those present while the Acting Grand Chaplain, Bro Rev Josephus Jaja made an equally fine job of dedicating the new VSL presented to the Grand Lodge of Nigeria by the Grand Lodge of Scotland. A further change was, instead of singing Psalm 22 to its usual tune, (which the majority of Brethren at home don't know anyway), the organist, Bro Amoniya G Festus, played Amazing Grace. The result was unbelievable with singing that was worthy of being recorded. At the conclusion of a very impressive Consecration Ceremony, the Grand Master handed over the emblem of authority to MW Bro George Dunlop, Grand Master of Ireland who, with his Office-bearers, installed the first Grand Master of Nigeria, Bro His Majesty Nnaemeka Alfred Achebe, Obi of Ontisha. Thereafter the new Grand Master installed all of his Office-bearers.

At the conclusion of both Ceremonies, the hall was cleared in preparation for the Banquet. Of necessity, the Banquet was a fairly lengthy evening by the time an excellent meal was enjoyed, speeches were given and responded to and a significant number of presentations were made.

After the excitement of the Consecration, it was expected that the Sunday would be a fairly quiet day but it proved to be nothing of the sort. After breakfast the Brethren returned to the Conference Centre where Bro the Rev Canon Josephus Jaja conducted a Thanksgiving Service which was well attended and inspirational to say the least. Again the singing was truly marvellous.

The Service was followed by a post Consecration and Installation Banquet which lasted well into the Sunday afternoon. However, the Grand Master Mason and I along with the Grand Master and Grand Secretary of Ireland were driven to the private residence of His Eminence Edidem Ekpo Okon Abasi Otu V where he entertained with drinks and an evening meal.

Monday 5th November marked the departure of the Scottish and Irish Deputations. The entire trip was exceptionally well managed by the Nigerian Brethren, especially by Grand Secretary, Brother Reginald Abbey-Hart whose attention to detail was outstanding.

Both the Grand Master Mason and I thank the Nigerian Brethren for their extraordinary hospitality and wish the new Grand Lodge of Nigeria every success in the years ahead.
