Last week I was at a meeting in Fauldhouse – over 130 Brethren signed the attendance sheet to witness a Reigning Master's Degree – an absolutely brilliant night – why are all Provinces not thinking about it? Because in many places they will face the "we never do that in this Province" response. Later in the newsletter Keith Murray highlights the need to do things in a way that will attract not just the prospective new candidate but his wife and family too.

Change can be difficult but a lot less difficult than closing a Lodge down.

PM Robin Cattenach kindly sent me the following article which recently appeared in the local press –

Freemasons in Tain this week set the wheels in motion for a big fundraising campaign by a local care home to buy a minibus for its residents.

Duthac House has a mammoth task ahead in raising the £18,000 needed to purchase a decent second hand minibus to get residents to the local swimming pool, the cinema, their monthly ceilidh and for trips out.

But big hearted Masons from Lodge St Duthus this week kick started the campaign by handing over a cheque for £800, the proceeds of several fund raisers over the year.

The Master, Bro Alan Pett said – "normally at the end of the year we distribute the cash we have raised to around four local charities but this year we were approached by Duthac House and we felt the case was so deserving that we gave them all the proceeds we raised this year, Hopefully this will give them a start and more donations will follow."

Highland Council withdrew the minibus which had been used by residents when it transferred ownership and running of Duthac House to private care company, Parklands Highland, this summer.

Duthac House manager, Eileen MacKay said: "we have identified two busses we can get first shout at but we need to raise the money fairly quickly. The residents go swimming each week and enjoy various other activities outside the home, but at the moment staff are taking residents in cars, which is not ideal. Trying to get somebody who is disabled or who has had a stroke in and out of a car is tricky. We manage between us but a bus would be so much more accessible. Duthac House has just won the Scottish Care Awards Most Meaningful Activities award so we are committed to giving our clients interesting and enjoyable activities. We would be delighted to hear from any local business who would like to donate to our fundraising because it makes such a huge difference to residents' well-being if they can get out and about doing things."

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BITS AND PIECES

View Points from Australia

In the Editorial of the August edition of the Patter I alluded to the fact that many of the more successful Lodges I encountered in Malaysia and Australia were those where they had an active social programme and where wives and girlfriends became actively involved. On reading the Editorial, Bro Keith Murray whose Mother Lodge is Paisley St James No 1116 in the Province of Renfrewshire East but who is now very much involved in two Lodges in Melbourne as well as the United Grand Lodge of Victoria, sent me the following observation. However, he also very kindly sent me an article which his wife had written for their Grand Lodge magazine. I am indebted to them both for allowing me to reproduce both articles which I'm sure you will find enlightening.

In Victoria, the craft has generally seen a trend where we are now getting younger, better educated and certainly more involved men joining. They have already researched and understood much more about freemasonry than possibly the majority of members in the lodges. Still, what is also noticeable is that they can quickly leave, if they do not find what we tell them freemasonry is really about. By that I mean, we promise them that they will become better men, that their priorities must be to their family first and that we support one another; that we promote quality in everything we do, including ceremonial but also in our surroundings and our meals/drinks. Both lodges that I am actively involved in only meet ceremonially 6 times a year but in the odd months, we usually have a social activity involved.

What we therefore are seeing is that those lodges that are not just talking about these principles, but actually do them are seeing a resurgence in membership and those that don't are withering. One lodge here had 19 candidates in a 12 month period and my other, Lodge Amalthea, had 10 candidates last year and has more in the wings, with 6 joining members also coming along. These are two new lodges and part of their success is that members who were disenchanted with the traditional lodges not doing anything, decided that rather than manage decline, they needed to do something different and ensure the continuity of the craft. The more traditional lodges that haven't moved with the times are suffering a declining level of participation, poor ceremonial, poor quality meals, few or no social activities and have almost adopted a suicidal tendency to see their lodge disappear over

It is not easy, takes effort, but the rewards are definitely there. The average attendance rate at lodges such as the two I attend is about 75% of members, whereas at a traditional lodge the average attendance rate is closer to 40-45%. So it shows that if we do what we say we do, but by making the changes it needs to suit the 21st Century we can have many young men joining lodges thereby ensuring its future prosperity.

To do this we do need to actively involve wives and partners. Don't expect them to be the ones to prepare the meals, rather pay a caterer. Ensure music is included in the ceremonies and the officers doing the work know their stuff and there is an active social committee that really gets the men and wives/partners involved. Many join a lodge to build a network of friends and if we assume one uninspiring meeting everyone/ two months or rehearsals will achieve that we are kidding ourselves. The lodges in Scotland in the past, often did these things right and repeated it, but seemed to have lost the knack, but equally didn't move with the times to recognise that the modern man/woman are looking for different things to encourage them to participate.

I was a mason before I got married, but Fiona is now a great supporter of the organisation, not because she sees what I get out of it, but because what she gets out of it!

Anyway, not wanting to give you a sermon, even if it is a Sunday, but thought you might like to hear a viewpoint from someone that has been in the craft for 30 years and experienced both the good and the not so good in both Scotland and here in Victoria.

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The following article is kindly reproduced from the Grand Lodge of Victoria Magazine in which Keith Murray's wife, Fiona, answers a number of very pertinent questions – hopefully her views will give many Brethren some food for thought.

Which Lodges does he belong to?

Keith is a member of a number of Lodges and Orders in both Australia and Scotland. SEAVIC Lodge and Lodge Amalthea, both based in Melbourne, are the ones I have become involved in. He is also a current member of the Grand Lodge team.

His joining year

Keith joined Freemasonry in 1983. He had already been a mason for several years before we met. At that time, I knew absolutely nothing about Freemasonry and that situation remained broadly unchanged for a long time as Keith's Lodge did not have mixed events. I was happy for him to go to his regular meetings with his friends. I believe there has been a significant shift in thinking within Freemasonry since that time, and the organisation is now much more inclusive of family. More recently we have become involved in Lodges where, in addition to the standard masonic elements, there are regular social events including partners and families. Some events are solely for socialising, whereas others are fundraisers for the Lodge's chosen charities.

What do you feel Freemasonry has done for your partner?

As he was already a Freemason when he arrived from Scotland, Keith was immediately able to meet a diverse group of likeminded men and now has many friends both in Australia and overseas. Ceremonial work has developed Keith's presentation and public speaking skills though some may argue his accent still needs work! He also enjoys the opportunity to escape from his work and meet with his masonic friends in a mutually supportive environment. Travel and international fraternity is also a benefit as Freemasonry is a worldwide network as evidenced by Keith's recent trips to Scotland for his mother Lodge's centenary and to Malaysia for a Lodge visit with some golf thrown in for good measure.

What would you say to other women whose partners are looking at joining?

Decide with your partner what his objectives are in joining the Lodge and make sure that you both agree that Freemasonry fits with your lifestyle and your other commitments. If you want to be involved with the Ladies, explore the opportunities for involvement by visiting ladies' events and speaking to existing members' partners before committing to a Lodge as each is a little different and each offers different opportunities. Some Lodges may only have a "Ladies Function" once or twice a year, whereas other ladies arrange their own entertainment during each Lodge meeting and then join with the men for dinner afterwards. Some Lodges also arrange more extensive social programs such as weekends away, after dinner speakers and visits to the theatre and galleries. There are fabulous opportunities to expand your own social network with other women from a very diverse range of backgrounds and you will be made welcome by the Lodge ladies.

A few tips for surviving as a masonic wife

Do not get talked into belly dancing. It is a once only experience, never to be repeated, ever.....

Even with two left feet, Greek dancing is much more fun and burns more calories than going to the gym.

If there is a chance to travel, go. Just book it and tell him he is going. Always allow at least an hour to leave a masonic function – that is how long it will take to say goodbye to all your friends.

FROM THE CAPE TO NATAL. 2013.

Wednesday, 22nd May

The lure of South Africa continues to attract me and early this morning I am once again departing on another reasonably lengthy overseas trip. On this occasion I am being accompanied by M.E. Companion Grahame Smith, Grand Scribe E, M.E. Companion William McEwan, Second Grand Principal and his wife Sheila.

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Having previously arranged to meet up at the Emirates Desk at Glasgow Airport we were quickly processed through "check in" and able to relax for a couple of hours or so prior to boarding our seven hour flight to Dubai.

Thursday, 23rd May.

Having passed through Dubai International Airport on several previous occasions I still marvel at the magnitude of the concourse with its numerous twenty four hour "shopping" attractions and what appears to be a multitude of departure gates all manned by highly efficient staff. Certainly, on the surface anyway, Emirates appear to be in the top bracket of Airlines.

Our onward flight departed on schedule and we prepared ourselves for the nine hour flight to Capetown where we arrived shortly before midday. Luggage was duly collected and we were driven to our Guest House. Having stayed here on a previous visit I am familiar with the location and look forward to a few days in very comfortable surroundings.

Shortly after breakfast we were collected by M.E. Companion Snell and his wife Gail who very kindly took us on a tour of the area culminating in being present at the firing of the Noon Gun.

De Goede Hoop Masonic Temple, one of the finest in the world, had been booked for our Ceremony this afternoon and is was an absolute delight for me personally to meet up with so many "old friends" some of whom I had met on my first visit to this beautiful city some thirteen years ago.

The new Grand Superintendent, M.E Companion Dobson along with his commissioned and elected Office Bearers were duly installed in the presence of a large number of Companions, several of whom represented other Orders and Constitutions. A most enjoyable harmony, enhanced by the presence of ladies, concluded another memorable occasion.

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Sunday, 26th May.

M.E. Companion Snell and his good lady Gail very kindly offered to drive us to Cape of Good Hope, an area which comprises a considerable part of Table Mountain National Park. Unfortunately fog persisted during part of the journey but by the time we arrived at the "Cape" it had cleared and we all enjoyed the spectacular views from the top having all taken advantage of the funicular railway facility.

Lunch at Groot Constantia Winery Restaurant in the company of the Snells. Turners and M.E. Companion Dobson and his fiancée proved at be another enjoyable interlude during this visit. Too soon it was time to depart, say our farewells, and go to the Airport to collect the hire car we had booked on our arrival. Unfortunately, the documentation having been laboriously completed, could not be found but after considerable delay and diplomatic persuasion we were allowed to drive away on the understanding that we would report for final authorisation at one of Europear's city offices. A somewhat frustrating end to an otherwise excellent day.

Monday, 27th May.

Packed and ready to go only to discover that, although the passengers were quite comfortable in a Toyota Corolla, our suitcases, in spite of valiant efforts, would not all fit into the boot space. Nothing really lost as our pre-arranged visit to Europear's city depot enabled us to upgrade to a Kia Sportage, clearly a more suitable vehicle albeit at an increased cost.

The inclusion of a "Sat Nav", if not absolutely essential, is advisable on the type of journey we are about to undertake and it was with a feeling of self-assurance that we left Capetown having been assured by the depot employee that he had correctly set it for the route we wished to follow. We left Capetown confident in the knowledge that modern technology had eliminated the need to concentrate on old fashioned road map "route planning". About two hours after departure we entered a small town to be advised by the Sat Nav "voice" that we had "reached our destination. Clearly this was wrong and as M.E. Companion McEwan was familiar with the model of GPS he soon had us driving in the right direction through very spectacular scenery.

At exactly 6 p.m. we arrived at the very comfortable Oakhurst Hotel in George which had been pre-booked. Time to relax and enjoy a light refreshment and dinner. Day one of our four day road journey is over.

Tuesday, 28th.

Having enjoyed a leisurely breakfast we set off for Port Elizabeth and arrived at Deer Park Farm Guest House mid-afternoon. M.E. Companion Basson, our local Grand Superintendent, having agreed to meet us at a pre-arranged rendezvous point on the outskirts of the city escorted us to this very comfortable and welcoming accommodation.

During the evening we attended a Meeting at Caledonia Lodge No 796 where we witnessed an excellent third Degree. This proved to be a most interesting location from my point of view as it was the first Lodge premises I had ever visited in South Africa many years ago and my small Deputation was made extremely welcome. It also provided me with an opportunity to meet up once again with several old friends and acquaintances I had met on previous visits.

Wednesday, 29th

Being advised that today's schedule involved a fairly long drive we set off in the direction of Grahamstown. An invitation from Past Depute Grand Superintendent Fergus Miles to break our journey at his farm near Cathcart was readily accepted. Mrs Miles had clearly gone to considerable trouble to prepare an abundance of food and we did justice to an excellent meal.

An interesting feature on this farm is a small church (originally Methodist), and now the property of M.E. Companion Miles in which weddings and Masonic church services are held. Onwards to the town of Cathcart where we stopped for a short time at the Lodge and met two senior Companions from Frontier Royal Arch

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Chapter. A very well preserved building and it was obvious that the Companions are enthusiastic and well advanced in their preparations for the Chapter Centenary Ceremony to be held in 2014. An invitation for representatives from Supreme Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Scotland to be present has been extended.

Being reminded of the length of the journey ahead and the advisability of reaching our destination before dark we took our farewells and drove off on the remainder of today's route. Lengthy delays occurred due to several road improvement schemes and we soon realised that our objective of being in MacLear before darkness fell could not be achieved.

We eventually did arrive at Fairbairn Farm Guest House which proved to be an excellent location, the property having recently been completely renovated and modernised. Having pre-booked an evening meal we heartily partook of a typical South African braai. A long day called for an early night.

Thursday, 30th

Now that we are able to view the surroundings in daylight we are able to appreciate the beauty of the area in which Fairbairn Guest House is situated. However as we faced another fairly length journey we did not delay our departure.

Accepting the advice we had been given by the Guest House owner regarding the most suitable route we should take to Pietermaritzburg, and once again having passed through some outstanding countryside we arrived at our final destination, the home of our new Grand Superintendent Designate, M.E. Companion Ken Tucker where we were warmly welcomed by both he and his wife Margaret who very kindly offered to host Grand Scribe E and M.E. Companion MacEwan and his wife Sheila during our sojourn here.

I had readily accepted an invitation to stay with our outgoing Grand Superintendent M.E. Companion Desmond Sykes and his good lady Janet. It was a distinct pleasure for me to do so as my wife and I had been their guests on several previous occasions. We then drove to their home where we were all entertained to dinner.

Friday, 31st May.

A suggestion that we visit an African Bird of Prey Sanctuary was readily agreed to and within half an hour's journey from the city we were escorted around this facility which is a place of safety for indigenous raptors. Many have been rescued in response to requests to care for trapped, injured or sick birds and when brought to the onsite hospital are examined by a veterinarian, treated, and if possible released back to the area in which they had been found.

Several birds have been bred in captivity, trained to a very high standard and we witnessed a display demonstrating a remarkable bond between bird and handler.

During the afternoon we met at Pietermaritzburg's impressive Masonic Temple for an informal discussion with several of the senior Companions from the District.

An exceptionally pleasant and relaxing evening was spent at the home of the District Grand Scribe E., M.E. Companion Watson and his wife Una who very kindly entertained us to dinner.

Saturday, 1st June.

A relaxing morning and early afternoon we again assembled at the Masonic Temple in preparation for today's Installation Ceremony. I was delighted to meet several Companions whom I had met on previous occasions while visiting this District. BOLIVIA & CHILE.

Tuesday 23rd/Wednesday, 24th August.

Scheduled to depart Edinburgh Airport at 9.10 a.m. en route to Amsterdam on the first leg of our somewhat lengthy flight to La Paz, Bolivia, Grand Scribe E and I left the Quality Inn shortly after 6 a.m. and having "checked in" and passed through security we emerged into the departure lounge area and noticed that our gate number would not be displayed until 9.30 a.m. Clearly this information indicated signs of a potential problem as we were aware that we only had forty minutes between our anticipated arrival and departure of the connecting flight. Eventually we left Edinburgh about 10.30 a.m. resigned to the fact that the "potential problem" had been upgraded to the "mission impossible" category.

The Transfer Desk at Amsterdam was obviously our first port of call and the KLM representative we approached could not have been more helpful. An overnight stay at their expense in a hotel with a confirmed booking on tomorrow's flight was suggested. An attempt to re-route us on alternative flights later in the day was also offered. After careful consideration we agreed to accept the offer of the alternative flights via Madrid necessitating a four delay while there, an onward flight to Lima with an arrival time of 5.10 a.m. After a five hour delay there we departed for La. Paz, via Santa Cruz eventually arriving at our final destination at 4 p.m. Fourteen hours later than we had anticipated.

On arrival at La Paz we were met by the Depute Grand Superintendent M.E. Companion Roberto Inchauste Varela, several senior District Office Bearers and M.E. Companion Seppo Ainamo, Past Grand Superintendent of Zimbabwe who was to form part of my Deputation on this visit. Being warmly welcomed by the local Companions we set off on a relatively short car journey and booked into the well-appointed and reasonably

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familiar Casa Grand Hotel as I had been allocated the same room I had occupied on my last visit five years previously.

An unforeseen problem arose due to our re-routing via Madrid in that M.E. Companion Smith's luggage failed to appear on the carousel at La Paz. The assurance that it would be on the next appropriate flight was duly proved correct.

During the evening the Grand Superintendent M.E. Companion J. Marica Prudencio and several other senior Companions entertained us to a most enjoyable dinner in a local restaurant.

Thursday, 25th.

Arrangements having been made for us to visit Lake Titicaca recognised worldwide as one of the classic images of Bolivia located at an altitude of 3810 metres and measuring 190 kilometres by 80 kilometres, it is by far the largest high altitude body of water in the world. M.E. Companion Hernan Jiminez Rivero, Depute Grand Superintendent Designate very kindly provided transport and the journey provided us with an opportunity to admire quite spectacular scenery.

Friday, 26th.

Once again we were given an opportunity to participate in another sightseeing tour involving a guided visit to the Presidential Palace. A building of remarkable beauty and fascinating historical importance.

Early evening we attended at the Masonic Temple, where in the presence of a large number of Companions we duly installed our new Grand Superintendent M.E. Companion Roberto Inchauste Varela and his commissioned Office Bearers. A most enjoyable harmony concluded another memorable day.



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Saturday, 27th

Today had been identified as a "free day" for relaxation with the very kind invitation from our new Grand Superintendent to visit his home where he provided a barbecue meal. He proved to be a most generous host and along with most of his Office Bearers we thoroughly enjoyed this informal "get together"

Sunday, 28th

A mid-morning check out from our hotel and we then enjoyed an excellent lunch at the home of our Depute Grand Superintendent, M.E. Companion Rivero and his wife Fernandez who also proved to be excellent hosts. A return trip to the airport to undertake the short flight to Tareja where we were met by the First Principal, M.E. Companion Raul Aguila Tareja Royal Arch Chapter, No 884 and a large number of local Companions who all extended a very warm and sincere welcome. After checking in at the Sur de Vino hotel we were quickly driven to a "down town" restaurant for another enjoyable meal.

Monday 30th

Shortly after 9 a.m. we were driven to the Kohlberg Winery where we had an interesting and informative tour of this establishment which also included a 'tasting session'. Thereafter we were entertained by the Grand Master M.W. Brother Anuar Awad at his luxurious home. A large number of Brethren and Companions were present and we spent a few hours being most hospitably entertained to a Bolivian barbecue enhanced by three accomplished Companions playing a selection of Bolivian music.

The main purpose of our visit to Tarija was to dedicate and consecrate the newly constructed temple of Tarija Royal Arch Chapter No 884. This ceremony was conducted with all due solemnity and we then adjourned to the palatial banqueting hall of the Marquesas' Restaurant where a sumptuous meal was enjoyed by all present.

Tuesday, 31st

Farewell to the Companions of Tarija and after a reasonably short flight with a brief stopover in Copabana we were soon in the Casa Grand Hotel in La Paz. No further commitments today.

Wednesday, 31st.

A suggestion that we visit the iconic town of Coroico, located approximately one hundred kilometres from La Paz was readily agreed to and accompanied by M.E. Companions Varela and Rivero, who had offered to drive, we left La Paz shortly after breakfast. Previously the only road to this area was along a route described as the world's most dangerous road engineered out of near vertical mountains descending more than three thousand, five hundred metres. Thankfully the road we travelled on was a multibillion dollar by pass, opened in 2006 and follows a route high over the old road and tunnels intermittently through the mountainside. Today's journey, while avoiding journalistic licence, could accurately be described as an adventure.

During the evening we enjoyed a farewell dinner with the Grand Superintendent, several senior Companions and their Ladies.

Thursday, 1st August.

Once again our hosts very kindly arranged transport and we are en route to Chile. The journey involved brief stops in Arica and Iquique before we finally landed early evening in Santiago. We were met at the airport and warmly welcomed by the First Principal of Pioneer Royal Arch Chapter No 599, M.E. Companion and two other Companions who drove us to our conveniently situated city centre Cambiaso Hotel.

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Friday, 2nd

Shortly after breakfast we were met by M.E. Companion Cotone Nicoreanu who had arranged for us to travel by Santiago's very efficient Metro system to the Grand Lodge of Chile. An extensive guided tour of the premises followed by lunch hosted by the Grand Master V.H.Luis Riveros Cornejo accompanied by senior Brethren and Companions proved to be a very fitting introduction to Masonic activities in Chile.

Saturday, 3rd

Collected by the Scribe E of the Chapter, M.E. Companion Biggs and Companion Dr Fischer we were taken on a sightseeing tour of the city which included a visit to a local craft market.

Later in the day Companion Fischer conveyed us to the Grand Lodge of Chile where we conducted the Re-Dedication Ceremony of Chapter Pioneer No 599. It is very encouraging to witness the excellent relationship which exists between the Companions of this Scottish Constitution Royal Arch Chapter and the Grand Master and Brethren of the Grand Lodge of Chile in whose premises they hold their meetings.



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Sunday, 4th

Along with several of the Chapter Companions we assembled outside our hotel before boarding a minibus to the city of Valparaiso. This proved to be another fascinating journey through the varied Chilean countryside. Prior to the building of the Panama Canal Valparaiso was the most important seaport in South America and although the passage of time has altered its importance it still appears to be a flourishing city.

One of the Companions, being a member of the exclusive Naval Club, had very kindly arranged for a private room to be set aside for our use where we were entertained to a most enjoyable lunch.

Monday, 5th

We took advantage of a "free day" by spending a few hours on a City Tour and the commentary certainly portrayed an illuminating insight into many of both the historical and modern aspects of a flourishing and busy city.
